Laurel Duty, Distinguished Young Woman of Covington County, will be one of 40 Mississippi high school seniors competing for more than \$42,500 in college scholarships when the Distinguished Young Women Program of 2012 begins Thursday, July 21, in Meridian, Mississippi.

The state program, now in its 55th year, celebrates and spotlights the outstanding achievements of the state's best and brightest high school girls. The three nights of competition in Meridian's Temple Theater for the Performing Arts concludes on Saturday, July 23. The curtain opens at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday and Friday, and 8 p.m. on Saturday.

Reserved tickets for the 2012 Distinguished Young Women Program are available for \$60 for a three-night package. General admission tickets are available for \$45 for a three-night package, or they may be purchased for individual evenings: \$15, Thursday; \$15, Friday; and \$20, Saturday. Tickets go on sale Monday, July 11 and may be obtained by calling 601-693-5353. Visa and MasterCard are welcomed.

"We are extremely excited about this year's program," said Marc Fisher, Distinguished Young Women of Mississippi State Chairman. "This program celebrates what is right with today's young people and offers them cash scholarship opportunities to further their education." At the conclusion of the state program this year, Distinguished Young Women of Mississippi will have awarded close to \$272,000 in cash college scholarships through its state and local programs this year.

Laurel, the daughter of Babette and Steven Duty of Collins, attends Lamar Christian School. Her academic accomplishments, memberships and hobbies include the following: Worship Leader, Founder and Student Leader of First Priority, Senior Beta Treasurer, Grand Champion in Group Talent Mississippi Senior Beta Club, 7th place National Senior Beta Club Group Talent Winner, Mississippi Lutenient Governor Page (2years), Volunteer at Community Food Giveaway (4 hours), GED Tutor (20 hours), singing and leading people in worhsip, and foreign and domestic mission work. She plans to attend William Carey University to pursue a career in Education and Mission/ Ministry Field.

During the weeklong program in Meridian, program contestants are evaluated on scholastic achievement, fitness, self-expression, talent and interview. Duty has chosen a vocal performance of Think of Me from The Phantom of the Opera for her talent.

Last year, Hannah Roberts, Distinguished Young Woman of Covington County, took the title of Distinguished Young Woman of Mississippi and a total of \$12,000 in scholarships. She was awarded a \$1,000 Mississippi Coca-Cola Bottlers scholarship and was the overall winner in talent.

The Distinguished Young Women Program was founded as America's Junior Miss in 1957 and is the oldest and largest scholarship program for young women. More than 6,500 high school girls participate each year. Past participants include Diane Sawyer, Debra Messing, Deborah Norville, Julie Moran, the late Mary Frann, Kim Basinger and Kathie Lee Gifford.
